Varner Selected to Design Exhibit

The Board of Trustees has chosen Gladstone artist Dale Varner as exhibit design consultant for the new depot museum at the Trolley Park. Mr. Varner presented an impressive illustrated plan to your officers, which included provisions for a large street scene diorama.

The artist has built successful dioramas for the Georgia-Pacific Historical Museum in Portland and is well-qualified for such work. His preliminary layout utilizes eight panels to depict "How the Trolley

Changed America." Visitors walking through the exhibit will see the evolution of the trolley and its impact upon society. Sequential panels with photographs, and display cases, will move from foot travel through the development of streetcar types (horse, steam, cable and
